Thurs 17th August	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Arrival/Welcome • Opening lecture 	Opening address by University of Liverpool team, and directors of the Centre for the Study of International Slavery (Dr Balch, Dr Benjamin), introduction to the rest of the workshop, tour of ISM and dinner
Fri 18th August	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Slaveries old and new - workshop 	Morning and afternoon session led by Dr Balch on slaveries past and present, with speakers from University of Liverpool, International Slavery Museum, and external speakers (tbc)
Sat 19th August	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Excursion/Day-trip 	Participants will be transported and provided with a tour of the Imperial War Museum (Salford) followed by lunch and a trip to Lancaster for the 'Slavery Walking Tour'
Sun 20th August	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Free day 	A range of different options will be suggested to participants to enjoy during their free day – there is a walking tour of Liverpool, and a number of tourist sites that can be visited
Mon 21st August	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Museums, Human Rights and Social Justice 	Morning session will take place at the University led by Dr Richard Benjamin (ISM) where the background to the Museum will be discussed, and participants will, through group workshops, be invited to develop critical perspectives on the Museum. The afternoon session will take place at the Museum where students will be invited to give short presentations on the findings of their research

<p>Tues 22nd August</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Memory, commemoration and representation - workshop • U-Boat tour (date/time tbc) 	<p>Morning - session on Dark Heritage, led by Prof Charles Forsdick, with external speaker (tbc) focusing on how scholars have researched the way in which troubled, traumatic or disturbing histories and heritage become sites of tourism, with particular reference to postcolonialism and sites connected with the transatlantic slave trade</p> <p>Afternoon – session led by Prof Eve Rosenhaft will focus on the ways in which literature and cinema deal with the challenge of history, in particular looking at fictional representations of trauma in the context of 'multidirectional memory'</p>
<p>Weds 23rd August</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Slavery Remembrance Day event at ISM 	<p>Keynote speaker (tbc) at the ISM, followed by 'master-class' led by speaker with the workshop participants.</p>
<p>Thurs 24th August</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Antislaveries old and new – Workshop 	<p>Morning and afternoon session looking at the connections between historical antislavery campaigns – 'making use of the past'. This will include presentations from the AHRC 'Usable past' project which has looked at the ways in which previous anti-slavery campaigns are of use to contemporary advocacy. The afternoon session will focus on the role of business in modern slavery – with contributions from speakers (tbc) who are researching the role of supply chains in exploitation, and companies that are developing initiatives to support survivors of modern slavery.</p>
<p>Fri 25th August</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Keynote • Presentations 	<p>The final workshop will comprise a keynote speaker, who will join a panel to comment on student presentations.</p>
<p>Sat 26th August</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • London trip • Final panel discussion 	<p>Participants will be transported and provided with a tour of the 'Sugar and Slavery' exhibition at the London Museum (Docklands), the day will also include a visit to the 'Liverpool in London' campus for a panel discussion.</p>
